Set off to explore the lush green mountain pastures of Col de l'Encrenaz and enjoy superb views of the Mont Blanc range, the Aravis peaks and the majestic Roc d'Enfer. After walking along a shaded path, you will gradually reach Col de la Basse, where Abondance cows graze peacefully. Climbing up through the mountain pasture to the left of the pass, you will reach the summit of Char des Quais, where the view is even more breathtaking.

#### **Description**

- (**D**) Departure from the Col de <u>l'Encrenaz</u> car park. Follow the signs for Col de la Basse, cross the road and take the path behind the Ancrenaz restaurant on the right.
- (1) A few metres further on, at the signpost for l'Encrenaz, turn right towards Les Pâquis.
- (2) When you reach Les Pâquis, take the path on the left towards Col de la Basse.
- (3) At Col de la Basse, take the path that descends to Col de l'Encrenaz.
- (A) Return to Col de l'Encrenaz.

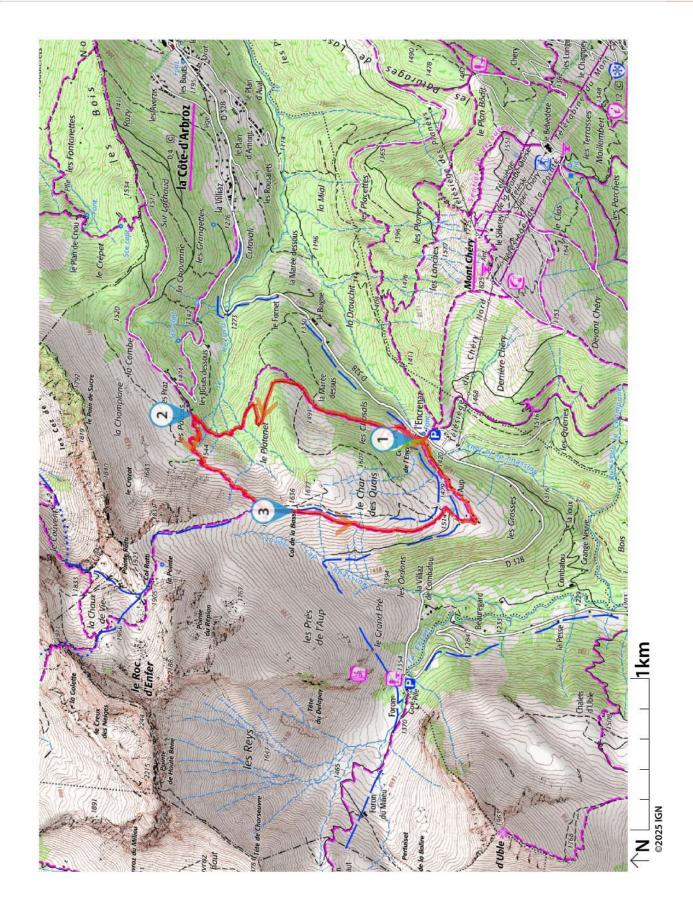

### Before the walk



## CHOOSE YOUR WALK CAREFULLY

by matching its difficulty and duration to your skill and physical ability.

## BE PROPERLY PREPARED

by taking suitable equipment with you, such as whistle, first-aid kit, appropriate clothing and something to eat and drink.



#### **LET SOMEONE KNOW**

where you will be walking.

# During the walk



## STAY ON THE PATH

Follow local signs and keep to marked paths unless wider access is available.



## TAKE YOUR RUBBISH HOME

and do not leave any trace of your journey except your footprint.



# RESPECT THE COUNTRYSIDE

by not damaging fences, fields and crops and not picking fruit or vegetables..



#### DON'T MAKE LOTS OF NOISE

and do be respectful and courteous to people along the route.



# RESPECT LOCAL RESTRICTIONS

such as bans on fires, barbecues, camping, fishing, swimming, etc.



#### KEEP YOUR DOG ON LEAD

and have it close to you at every crossroads of other users. Bag and bin its dog poo. Walking with a dog is not recommended on routes where there are farm animals.



# LEAVE GATES AS YOU FIND THEM

be cautious of farm animals : try to go around, not through hersd or flocks.



# THE COUNTRYSIDE IS A LIVING ENVIRONMENT

that evolves with time. Waling is an adventure and there ar erisks associated with it. Be responsible, and know when it is better to give up and turn around than get into danger.
